Makes 1 coloured ball

Prep 10 minutes

You will need

- 8 tbsp plain flour
- 2 tbsp table salt
- 60ml warm water
- food colouring
- 1 tbsp vegetable oil

Method

1. Mix the flour and salt in a large bowl. In a separate bowl mix together the water, a few drops of food colouring and the oil.
2. Pour the coloured water into the flour mix and bring together with a spoon.
3. Dust a work surface with a little flour and turn out the dough. Knead together for a few minutes to form a smooth, pliable dough. If you want a more intense colour you can work in a few extra drops of food colouring.
4. Store in a plastic sandwich bag (squeeze out the air) in the fridge to keep it fresh.

Use shape cutters and tools to shape, cut and mould your playdough. Add buttons, straws or sequins to create different effects. You could use cupcake trays and candles to create playdough cupcakes.



Handprint Butterfly

Supplies

- Paint
- Shallow trays or plates
- A4 Paper
- Butterfly Body Template
- Googly eyes
- Glue
- Felt-tip pen
- Wipes



- 1 First, fold your piece of paper in half, lining up the short sides of the paper. Then open it out again and lay it flat on the table.



- 4 As butterflies are symmetrical, this means that the other wing needs to look exactly the same! To do this, use your other hand to make 2 or 3 handprints of the same colours and positions as the first wing. Allow the hand prints to dry.



- 2 Next, spread some paint into one of the plates or trays. Gently press your hand into the paint and then onto the paper, with your thumb next to the fold line.



- 5 Next, carefully cut out the Butterfly Body Template and stick it along the fold line between the handprint wings.



- 3 Then, wipe/wash your hand clean and choose a different colour of paint. Use the same hand to make another handprint - just under the first one, again with the thumb near the fold line. You can repeat this with a final colour if you like. One wing is now finished!



- 6 Finally, stick on 2 googly eyes then draw a mouth and 2 curly antennae.

Fingerprint Flowers

Supplies

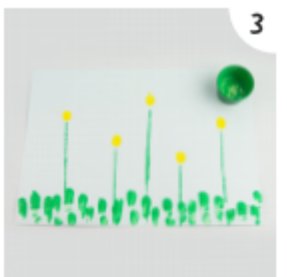
- A selection of coloured paints
- Blue or green paper or card
- Lolly stick



- 1 First, take the paper or card and lay it out landscape. Now, dip a fingertip into yellow paint and print 5 or 6 yellow dots, evenly spaced, going across the page. The dots need to be about halfway up the paper. Then wash or wipe your finger so that it is clean of paint.



- 2 Dip the long edge of the lolly stick into green paint. Then use this to print some stems coming down from each yellow spot to the bottom edge of the paper.



- 3 Now create some grass going along the bottom of the paper. To do this, dip a fingertip into the green paint, then place the finger just above the bottom edge of the paper and drag it down. Repeat until there is a row of grass going along the full length of the bottom of the paper. Then wash or wipe your finger so that it is clean of paint.



- 4 Finally, make petals to go on your flowers! Do this by dipping your fingertip into some paint, then print circle shapes going around the outside edge of each yellow print. Repeat until all of the flowers have got petals; you may want to use different colours or make a repeating pattern.

Yoghurt Pot Frog

Supplies

- 2 small yoghurt pots
- Green tissue paper
- Pink, green and red card
- Googly eyes
- PVA glue
- Sticky tape
- Black felt-tip pen



- 1 Use the PVA glue to stick pieces of green tissue paper to the outside of the yoghurt pots. Do this until they are completely covered, then leave to dry.



- 5 Next add the feet to the bottom of the pot, sticking them on using glue. Leave to dry.



- 2 Now work on the bottom part of the frog. Cut out a square of pink card that is slightly smaller than the rim of the yoghurt pot. Also cut out a tongue shape from the red card and two frog feet from the green card.



- 6 Then work on the yoghurt pot that will form the top of the frog. First turn the yoghurt pot upside down, stick googly eyes on and then add some nostrils using the black felt-tip pen.



- 3 Cover the edges of the yoghurt pot top with glue and stick on the square of pink card, then leave to dry.



- 7 Finally, using sticky tape, join the two pots together along the back edge. This should create a hinge for the mouth. Then trim off the excess tape.



- 4 Stick the tongue onto the pink card so that it sticks out over the edge of the pot.
